### *From the Rector's Desk*

Our liturgical calendar reminds us that on Monday, August 15, it is time for us to celebrate the Feast of St. Mary the Virgin. This is a Major Holy Day of the church, but even if it falls on a Sunday it does not take precedence over Sunday, so it is transferred to a weekday. Therefore, it is celebrated only at our mid-week service.

Mary is perhaps the most famous women ever to have lived, but what we know about her is limited to a few references in the Gospels and in the first chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. However, devotion to her developed quickly among early Christians and continues to be an important part of the spirituality of many followers of our Lord.

Most of the passages concerning Mary occur in the Gospel of Luke, where we read about the Annunciation—the appearance of the angel Gabriel telling Mary that she will conceive a son of the Holy Spirit, who is to be named Jesus and will be the Son of God. We read of her obedience in the face of her fear and uncertainty about the future. Luke presents Mary as the first person to hear the Good News that God is to become incarnate.

Her response fulfills the description Jesus gave of what is required of a disciple as given in the Gospel of Mark, "Whoever does the will of God is...mother to me."

It is also in Luke that we find the *Magnificat*—Mary's joyful song in which she blessed God. At the Annunciation, Gabriel told Mary that Jesus is the Messiah, but in this song she interprets this Good News into what it will mean for Jesus to come into the world. The lowly are to be exalted; the rich are to be sent away empty. Jesus is to be the blessing of

those who are poor, hungry, and sorrowful, but there are woes in store for those who are rich, satisfied, and reveling in their own power. In the *Magnificat*, Mary brings to us a sign of hope and of God's care for those who are oppressed and downtrodden. Luke continues his portrayal of Mary following Jesus' birth as she listens to what the shepherds said that God had made known to them about Jesus. "Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart."



Mary's life was not to be one without sorrow and pain. When the child Jesus was presented at the temple for his circumcision, Simeon prophesied, saying, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too." This prophecy about Mary was fulfilled at the foot of the cross, where Jesus' grieving mother stood watching her son die. In Acts, she is shown to be a disciple, devoting herself to prayer along with the others.

Mary was not only the mother of God's son, the Messiah. In Eastern Christianity, she is referred to as *Theotokos*, the mother of God. Throughout the Gospels, she is shown as fulfilling the requirements of discipleship, serving as a model and

inspiration to all of us. Mary was fully human, just as we are, and yet she was able to be the kind of disciple that God calls all of us to be—even in the face of fearful and tragic events in her life.

Collect for the Feast of the Virgin Mary: O God, you have taken to yourself the blessed Virgin Mary, mother of your incarnate Son: Grant that we, who have been redeemed by his blood, may share with her the glory of your eternal kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

- Lancaster Homeless Shelter has been operated for a long time by Catholic Charities but they are no longer able to do it. There are some groups interested in taking it over. Dana Haycock will try and get some information and Claire Humphrey will find out if we can expect some changes in our involvement.
- Rev. Nancy had a new recorder that will allow her sermons to be posted on the website.

**Treasurer's Report**

- Reports were distributed and discussed.
- The Pentecost donations have benefited the Office Supplies budget category.
- Mission Share for April was paid but May and June are still owed.
- Leslie Montesdeoca reminded everyone that we need to save money for the big summer electric bills. She called Verizon and was able to reduce our monthly bill on the telephone/internet.
- Holly and Rose Tea has its own budget category to help track income and expenses.
- Treasurers' report will be filed for audit.

**Old Business**

- Stewardship Campaign this year is themed "We Walk By Faith." Each vestry member will do a presentation (about 5 minutes) at both services, touching on how they came to be a member of St. Paul's, what they do on the Vestry, and why they pledge to St. Paul's.
- Stewardship Dinner will be on Saturday, November 12. Pledge cards will be handed out at the dinner.
- Vestry will do coffee hour on November 13.

**New Business**

- There will not be a meeting in July unless something unforeseen comes up.

**Buildings and Grounds**

- Thanks are due to the Men's Group for the fine job of cleaning up the Nursery playground and surrounding area in May, and for the tree-felling on the north side of the

Church. Thank you to Julia Armitage, Cindy Walker, Paula Smith and the Boy Scouts for the help with the clean up of the fallen foliage, etc.

- A water leak was found on the west wall of the nursery building which was creating a wet spot in the St. Nicholas room. Plumber was called out. Upon arrival of plumber a new leak was discovered causing water to flow out into the parking lot. Both leaks and a leaking spigot were repaired by the plumber for the cost of \$165.00.
- Tom Moore and Dave Miklos have been working on a schedule for the rose garden. Some work needs to be done to make them made less maintenance-intensive.
- Discussion was held on work needed in Sunday school building like new flooring and some maintenance.

**Christian Education**

- Charles Fairman plans to shadow and help Sandy Salser with VBS so he can have more to report on next month.
- Charles Fairman also did some checking on costs to replace flooring in Nursery room of Sunday School building but the A/C and other issues in the Guild Hall are of higher priority.
- It was suggested that the Medrano's fundraiser income could possibly go to the flooring in the Nursery.

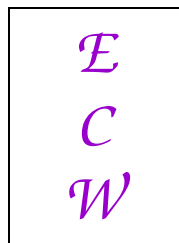
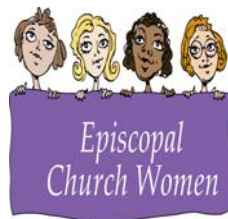

## **GETTING TO KNOW THE SAINTS**

**St. Clare of Assisi  
1194 a.d.-1253 a.d**

**Italy**

**Feast day: August 11**

Like a number of great saints, Clare Offreduccio, better known today as St. Clare of Assisi, was born into a wealthy family. Her mother Ortolana was very pious and had raised Clare to be a person of prayer and kindness who had great concern for the poor. At the age of 18 she heard St. Francis of Assisi preach and was inspired to forsake her life of privilege and devote her life to living according to Francis' principles of austerity and service to the poor.

Her family was horrified at her decision and had her shut away in the family home but she escaped by a small door called the "door of the dead" because it was normally only used when carrying a corpse from the house. She went to a Franciscan house and there St. Francis himself cut off her hair and gave her a plain homespun robe and a cord for a belt. She would later refer to herself as "the little plant of the most blessed Francis". She took refuge at another convent and was protected by papal interdiction against her family's taking her back home by force.

Ultimately Clare was joined by her widowed mother, two of her sisters, her best friend, and several members of another wealthy local family. Clare refused Francis' suggestion that she be the Superior of the Order, preferring to wait until she became 21. The order of women was originally known as Minoreesses since the Franciscan Brothers were known as Friars Minor. Eventually they became known as "the Poor Clares". Their life was indeed one of poverty and hardship. They owned no property at all and ate very little, no meat at all, and only what they

were able to beg. They had no beds but rather slept on twigs with patched hemp blankets. The wind and rain came in through the cracks in the ceiling of their house. They kept silent most of the time yet were very happy because they always felt close to the Lord.

Once Clare's intercessions saved her sisters from soldiers who were attacking Assisi and planning to raid the convent. Clare, who was very ill, was carried to the wall and had the Blessed Sacrament placed where the enemy soldiers could see it. Then she prayed on her knees that God would spare her nuns. A voice seemed to answer "I will keep them always in My care". At the same time the enemy became frightened and fled in great haste.

Clare and her sisters in the order ministered to the poor, the sick and the neglected. Clare herself suffered illness for many years yet said no pain could trouble her because her joy in God's service was so great. The austerity of her order was the greatest of any order known up to that time but Clare denied that they were poor: "They say that we are too poor, but can a heart which possesses the infinite God be truly called poor?"

The community of Poor Clares continues to this day in both the Roman Catholic and the Anglican communions.

### **Prayer:**

"O God, whose blessed Son became poor that we through his poverty might be rich: Deliver us from an inordinate love of this world, that we, inspired by the devotion of your servant Clare, may serve you with singleness of heart, and attain to the riches of the age to come; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever."



Ministry Sunday will be held on September 11, 2011. We will have one service at 9 am followed by the opportunity to browse the courtyard and discover all the different ministries we have at St. Paul's. If you are part of a group and would like table space, please contact the church office.

- Tape



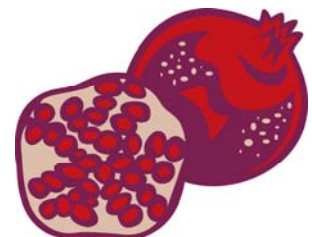
**What you do:**

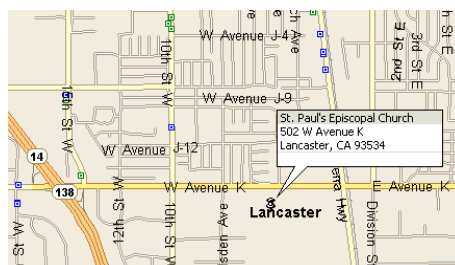
